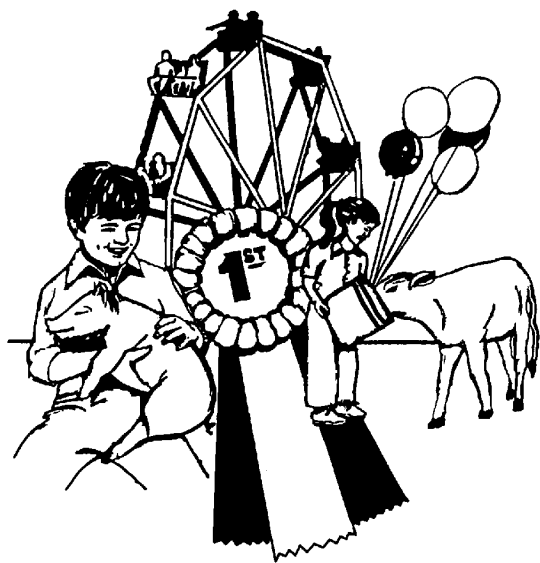
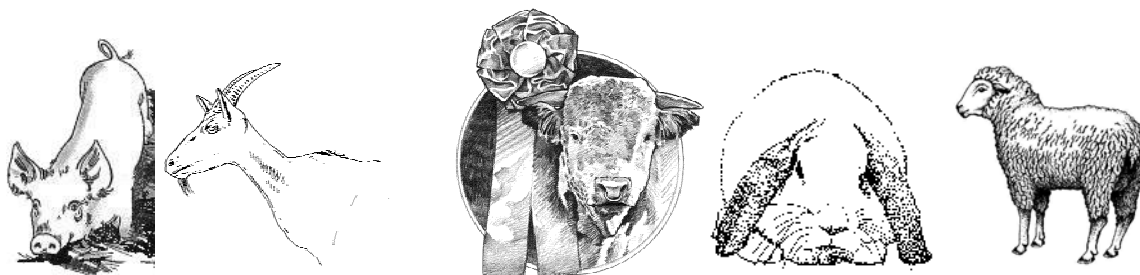

Final interpretation and administration of these rules are vested in the Executive Committee of the Lake County Fair Board of Directors or the Chairman of the Livestock Committee, as appropriate. Their decisions will be final.

The Lake County Fair offers no guarantee of profitability nor of the right to show or sell any animal that is disqualified for any reason.

HEALTH REGULATIONS AND REQUIREMENTS

For Admission of Animals for Exhibition

5C-4.001 General Requirements and Limitations.

- (1) Official Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (OCVI) Required. All animals for exhibition in Florida, unless specifically exempted, must be accompanied by an OCVI issued by a veterinarian accredited in the state of origin.
 - (a) The OCVI must be complete including the breed, name and registration number, and permanent identification such as tattoo, ear tag number, microchip number, or brand.
 - (b) Results of a specific test requirement or herd certification or validation number for each animal must be recorded on the OCVI with the date of the test or herd certification or validation.
- (2) For exhibition purposes only, an OCVI is valid for 90 days from the date of issue; or until the expiration date of any required tests, whichever is the earliest date. For importation into the State, the OCVI is valid for 30 days pursuant to Rule 5C3.002(I)(c).
- (3) Exemption to Required OCVI. An OCVI is not required for animals originating in the State of Florida and entered in market classes provided that the animals are segregated from other animals and the pens are occupied only by the animals in a market class. Pens used for market classes must not be reused until after cleaning and disinfecting.
- (4) Prior to acceptance at an exhibition, all animals presented for exhibition must be visually inspected by a veterinarian licensed in the state of Florida, or by a Department representative for:
 - (a) The required identification of the animals;
 - (b) Clinical signs of disease; and
 - (c) Evidence of compliance with test requirements.
- (5) Any animal which has clinical signs of contagious or infectious disease on visual inspection or any animal which is known to be exposed must be:
 - (a) Withdrawn from exhibition and returned to the place of origin, or
 - (b) Examined at the owner's expense within 24 hours by a veterinarian licensed in the State of Florida who certifies by a signed written statement that the animals is free of contagious or infectious disease.
- (6) All vehicles transporting animals for exhibition in Florida shall be cleaned and disinfected prior to the loading of such animals.

5C-4.0015 Definitions. For the purposes of this Chapter the following definitions shall apply:

- (1) Accredited veterinarian. A licensed veterinarian who has been approved to perform certain functions of the federal and cooperative federal-state programs by the Deputy Administrator, United States Department of Agriculture, Animals and Plant Health Inspection Service, Veterinary Services, in accordance with the provisions of 9 CFR 161 (1993).
- (2) Animal(s). This term shall include:
 - (a) Livestock including grazing animals, such as cattle, horses, sheep, swine, goats, and other hoofed animals;
 - (b) Ratites, limited to ostriches, emus, and rheas;
 - (c) Domesticated fowl which are propagated or maintained for commercial, exhibition, or breeding purposes, or as pets; and
 - (d) Wild or game animals which may threaten the agricultural interests of the state.
- (3) Department. The Florida Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services.
- (4) Department Representative. An employee of the Department who is authorized to perform animal health regulatory activities regarding the prevention, control, and eradication of certain infectious or communicable diseases of animals.
- (5) Division. The Division of Animal Industry of the Florida Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services.
- (6) Exhibition. An assembly of animals for the purpose of competition or public presentation including but not limited to fairs, shows, and rodeo events.
- (7) Group. One or more animals maintained on the same premises or in contact.
- (8) Horse. Any horse, mule, ass, zebra, or other equidae.
- (9) Isolation. Separation of individual animals by a physical barrier in a manner that assures one animal does not have access to the body, excrement, or discharges of another animal; does not share a building with a common ventilation system; and is not within ten feet of another animal.
- (10) Market Class. An exhibition class consisting of finished fed animals where all animals in the class go directly to slaughter immediately following exhibition.
- (11) Official Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (OCVI). An official form approved by the senior animal health official of the state of origin or in equivalent form from the USDA, which is a complete and legible certificate issued by a veterinarian who is licensed and accredited in the state of origin.
- (12) Official test. A test conducted by a method approved by Department rules for the specific disease and animal species.
- (13) Segregated. The maintenance of one group of animals so as to prevent physical contact with another group of animals.
- (14) USDA. The United States Department of Agriculture.
- (15) Materials. Title 9 CFR 161 (1993) is hereby incorporated by reference.

5C-4002 Cattle

- (1) OCVI Required. Cattle for exhibition must be accompanied by an OCVI dated not more than 90 days prior to presentation and must be accompanied by evidence of completion of the test requirements or certification listed in 5C-4.002(2).
- (2) Test or Certification Required.

(a) Tuberculosis.

1. Cattle may be entered for exhibition without a tuberculin test provided the OCVI identifies the cattle as originating from a Tuberculosis-Free State as defined in rule 5C-7.016(3), Florida Administrative Code, and Accredited Tuberculosis-Free Herd, as defined in rule 5C-7.016(l), Florida Administrative Code, or a herd not under quarantine in a Modified Accredited Tuberculosis State, as defined in rule 5C7.016(23), Florida Administrative Code. When accredited, the herd accreditation number must be recorded on the OCVI.
2. Other cattle may be entered for exhibition provided the cattle originate from a herd not under quarantine and have a negative tuberculin test with 30 days prior to the date of the exhibition.
3. A positive test on any animal in a designated group, disqualifies all animals of the group from exhibition.

(b) Brucellosis.

1. Vaccination Required. All female dairy cattle four months of age or older, born after January 1984 must be officially calfhood vaccinated.
2. Test Required. Cattle from herds not under quarantine in Class A Areas must have evidence of a negative brucellosis test within 30 days prior to the date of exhibition.
3. Exemption from Required Test.
 - a. Steers and spayed heifers are exempt from the brucellosis test requirement.
 - b. Cattle identified on the OCVI as originating from a Certified Brucellosis-Free Herd, as defined in rule 5C-6.002, Florida Administrative Code, or a Class Free Area, as defined in rule 5C-6.0031 (4) (c)3., Florida Administrative Code, are exempt from the brucellosis test requirement. When certified, the herd certification number must be recorded on the OCVI.
 - c. Cattle from non-quarantined herds originating from Class A Areas are exempt from brucellosis test requirements provided that the cattle are:
 1. Under 18 months of age; or
 2. Official calfhood vaccinates of beef breeds under 24 months of age; or
 3. Official calfhood vaccinates of dairy breeds under 20 months of age; and
 4. Not parturient or post parturient.

5C-4.003 Swine.

- (1) OCVI Required. All breeding swine for exhibition must be accompanied by an OCVI dated not more than 90 days prior to presentation and must be accompanied by evidence of completion of the test requirements or certifications listed in 5C4.003(2).
- (2) Test or Certification Required.
 - (a) Brucellosis. All breeding swine over six months of age entered for exhibition, excluding barrows and gilts in market classes, must originate from a Validated Brucellosis-Free Herd, as defined in rule 5C-6.008, Florida Administrative Code, or must be recorded negative to a brucellosis test within 30 days of the date of the exhibition. When validated, the validation herd number must be on the OCVI.
 - (b) Pseudorabies. All breeding swine over six months of age entered for exhibition, excluding barrows and gilts in market classes, must originate from a Qualified Pseudorabies-Free Herd, as defined in rule 5C-21.005(2), Florida Administrative Code, or be negative to a pseudorabies test within 30 days of the date of exhibition. When qualified, the qualified herd number must be recorded on the OCVI.
- (3) Isolation. Swine returning to the farm from exhibitions must be isolated from other swine at least 30 days before being returned to the herd. Breeding swine for exhibition must be maintained in isolation between exhibitions or move directly between exhibitions.

5C-4.004 Poultry, Domestic Fowl and Ratites.

- (1) OCVI Required. An OCVI is required for domestic fowl and ratites for movement into Florida, but not specifically from Pullorum-Typhoid Clean flocks or hatcheries, as defined in rule 5C-16.008, Florida Administrative Code, or have a negative Pullorum-Typhoid test within 90 days prior to exhibition.
- Exemption from OCVI. An OCVI is not required for exhibition of domestic fowl or ratites which originate in Florida; however, these domestic fowl and ratites must be inspected as provided in 5C-4.001(4).

5C-4.005 Goats.

- (1) OCVI Required. Goats for exhibition in Florida must be accompanied by an OCVI dated not more than 90 days prior to presentation and must be accompanied by evidence of completion of the test requirements of certifications listed in 5C4.005(2).
- (2) Test or Certification Required.
 - (a) Tuberculosis. All animals over six months of age must have a negative tuberculin test within 90 days prior to exhibition or must originate from an Accredited Tuberculosis-Free Herd, as defined in rule 5C-7.016(l), Florida Administrative Code. When accredited, the accredited herd number must be recorded on the OCVI.
 - (b) Brucellosis. All animals over six months of age must be negative to a brucellosis test within 90 days prior to exhibition or must originate from a Certified Brucellosis-Free Herd. A Certified Brucellosis-Free Goat Herd is a herd which meets the requirements for a Certified Brucellosis-Free Herd as set forth in SC-6.002, Florida Administrative Code. When certified, the certified herd number must be recorded on the OCVI.

5C-4.007 Sheep.

OCVI Required. Sheep for exhibition must be accompanied by an OCVI dated not more than 90 days prior to presentation.

SC-4.009

Other Species. Any animal for exhibition not specifically provided for in this Chapter, must be accompanied by an OCVI.

5C-4.010 Penalties for Violations.

- (1) Documents. Any person who forges, counterfeits, simulates or alters, or who knowingly possesses, uses, presents or utters any forged, counterfeited, altered or simulated official certificate of veterinary inspection or any other document relating to animal health requirements of one animal for another commits a felony of the third degree punishable as provided in Section 775.082, 775.083, or 776.084, FS.
- Other Violations. Except as noted in (1) of this section, any person who violates the provisions of this Chapter shall be subject to the imposition of an administrative fine of up to \$10,000 for each offense.

THE LAKE COUNTY FAIR SUPPORTS THE NATIONAL CODE OF SHOW RING ETHICS

Exhibitors of animals at livestock shows shall at all times deport themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship. Their conduct in this competitive environment shall always reflect the highest standards of honor and dignity to promote the advancement of agricultural education. This code applies to junior as well as open class exhibitors who compete in structured classes of competition. This code applies to all livestock offered in any event at a livestock show. In addition to the "IAFE National Code of Show Ethics," fairs and livestock shows may have rules and regulations which they impose on the local, county, state, provincial and national levels.

All youth leaders working with junior exhibitors are under an affirmative responsibility to do more than avoid improper conduct or questionable acts. Their moral values must be so certain and positive that those younger and more pliable will be influenced by their fine example. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers and absolutely responsible persons who violate the code of ethics will forfeit premiums, awards and auction proceeds and shall be prohibited from future exhibition in accordance with the rules adopted by the respective fairs and livestock shows. Exhibitors who violate this code of ethics demean the integrity of all livestock exhibitors and should be prohibited from competition at all livestock shows in the United States and Canada.

The following is a list of guidelines for all exhibitors and all livestock in competitive events:

1. All exhibitors must present, upon request of fair and livestock show officials, proof of ownership, length of ownership and age of all animals entered. Misrepresentation of ownership, age, or any facts relating thereto is prohibited.
2. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers, or absolutely responsible persons shall provide animal health certificates from licensed veterinarians upon request by fair or livestock show officials.
3. Junior exhibitors are expected to care for and groom their animals while at fairs or livestock shows.
4. Animals shall be presented to show events where they will enter the food chain free of violative drug residues. The act of entering an animal in a livestock show is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer and/or absolutely responsible person for show management to obtain any specimens of urine, saliva, blood, or other substances from the animal to be used in testing. Animals not entered in any event which culminates with the animal entering the food chain shall not be administered drugs other than in accordance with applicable federal, state and provincial statutes, regulations and rules. Livestock shall not be exhibited if the drugs administered in accordance with federal, state and provincial statutes, regulations and rules affect the animal's performance or appearance at the event.

If the laboratory report on the analysis of saliva, urine, blood, or other sample taken from livestock indicates the presence of forbidden drugs or medication, this shall be prima facie evidence such substance has been administered to the animal either internally or externally. It is presumed that the sample of urine, saliva, blood, or other substance tested by the laboratory to which it is sent is the one taken from the animal in question, its integrity is preserved and all procedures of said collection and preservation, transfer to the laboratory and analysis of the sample are correct and accurate and the report received from the laboratory pertains to the sample taken from the animal in question and correctly reflects the condition of the animal at the time the sample was taken, with the burden on the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person to prove otherwise.

At any time after an animal arrives on the fair or livestock show premises, all treatments involving the use of drugs and/or medications for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal shall be administered by a licensed veterinarian.

5. Any surgical procedure or injection of any foreign substance or drug or the external application of any substance (irritant, counterirritant, or similar substance) which could affect the animal's performance or alter its natural contour, confirmation, or appearance, except external applications of substances to the hoofs or horns or animals which affect appearance only and except for surgical procedures performed by a duly licensed veterinarian for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal is prohibited.
6. The use of showing and/or handling practices or devices such as striking animals to cause swelling, using electrical contrivance, or other similar practices are not acceptable and are prohibited.
7. Direct criticism or interference with the judge, fair or livestock show management, other exhibitors, breed representatives, or show officials before, during, or after the competitive event is prohibited. In the furtherance of their official duty, all judges, fair and livestock show management, or other show officials shall be treated with courtesy, cooperation and respect and no person shall direct abusive or threatening conduct toward them.
8. No owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person shall conspire with another person or persons to intentionally violate this code of ethics or knowingly contribute or cooperate with another person or persons either by affirmative action or inaction to violate this code of ethics. Violation of this rule shall subject such individual to disciplinary action.
9. The application of this code of ethics provides for absolute responsibility for an animal's condition by an owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or participant whether or not he or she was actually instrumental in or had actual knowledge of the treatment of the animal in contravention of this code of ethics.
10. The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person to have disciplinary action taken by the fair or livestock show for violation of this Code of Show Ring Ethics and any other rules of competition of the fair or livestock show without recourse against the fair or livestock show. The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent that any proceedings or disciplinary action taken by the fair or livestock show may be published with the name of the violator or violators in any publication of the International Association of Fairs and Expositions, including *Fairs and Expositions* and any special notices to members.
11. The act of entering of an animal in a fair or livestock show is the giving of verification by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person that he or she has read the IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics and understands the consequences of and penalties provided for actions prohibited by the code. It is further a consent that any action which contravenes these rules and is also in violation of federal, state, or provincial statutes, regulations, or rules may be released to appropriate law enforcement authorities with jurisdiction over such infractions.

I. EXHIBITOR ELIGIBILITY

- A. The Lake County Fair Shows and Sales are open to bona fide FFA and 4-H members exclusively. All exhibitors MUST be a resident of Lake County or attending an accredited Lake County School. High School graduates shall be ineligible to enter or exhibit. All FFA exhibitors must qualify for extracurricular activities as required by the laws of the State of Florida and provide a Certificate of Eligibility from his or her school principal. All 4-H exhibitors must qualify and meet the policy requirements of the Florida Cooperative Extension Service and provide a Letter of Acceptance from the Extension Office.
- B. The residence requirement is waived for entrants in Invitational Shows.
- C. An FFA chapter or 4-H club shall be considered to be an eligible exhibitor.
- D. An official application form must be completed and accepted for each animal to be exhibited. The Lake County Fair Board reserves the right to limit the number of animals in all shows and sales and to alter class divisions when necessary.
- E. An exhibitor may only show and sell one (1) market animal.
- F. All exhibitors are required to wear the appropriate attire when exhibiting and selling livestock.
- G. Junior exhibitors must be 12 & under on September 1, 2005.

II. EXHIBITOR RESPONSIBILITIES

- A. Official application forms must be signed by the exhibitor, the exhibitor's parent or guardian and the exhibitor's FFA advisor or 4-H leader. Applications must be accepted in the fair office or postmarked on or before the deadline for each show. Applications for steer and swine must be presented at initial weigh-in, accepted and filed.
- B. Exhibitors are expected to conduct themselves as ladies and gentlemen at all times and each exhibitor is responsible for his or her own behavior. Conduct that violates the laws of the State of Florida, the rules of the Lake County Fair, or which in any way brings discredit to the Fair or Shows may lead to disqualification from showing or selling the exhibitor's entries, and may bar the exhibitor from future exhibition, or both.
- C. Lake County Fair project Record Books will be available on our website at www.lakecofair.com. If you have any problems please call the fair office at 357-7111. These must be completed, approved and signed by the exhibitor, parent or guardian, and 4-H leader or FFA advisor and submitted to the Livestock Committee Chairman or Designee within ONE HOUR after the close of animal check-in time. **FAILURE TO COMPLY WILL RESULT IN THE ANIMAL BEING DISQUALIFIED. (Use Lake County Fair Record Book.)** Unacceptable or incomplete record books, as determined by a screening committee, MAY be cause for exhibitor disqualification from showing their animal(s).
- D. Should an animal be eliminated from the Fair for other than disciplinary reasons or an unacceptable record book, the exhibitor's record book remains eligible for record book contests and awards, if any.
- E. Each exhibitor is expected to maintain, clean and keep the quarters of his or her livestock attractive at all times. Feed, hay, equipment, tack and tools necessary for the maintenance, care and proper display of the animals must be provided by the exhibitor. If hay is to be used, hay bags MUST be provided and used by the exhibitor. Said items must be removed from the barn promptly after the Show or Sale.
- F. All animals (except Swine) must be halter broken and kept under control by the exhibitor. No animal may compete that cannot be properly managed and led by the exhibitor. The Barn Superintendent shall assign an area to all exhibitors.
- G. EXHIBITORS ARE REQUIRED TO DEMONSTRATE THEIR ABILITY TO SAFELY CONTROL THEIR ANIMALS. After all animals are checked in, a parade will be held from the assigned area, through the show ring, and back to the assigned area. Each exhibitor shall untie parade demonstrate their ability to show their animal and resecure their animal. Exhibitor responsibilities for demonstrating their animal will include setting up their animal, walking their animal while having control of their animal. Each exhibitor will be required to do all steps without assistance regardless of age and size of exhibitor. Any exhibitor who fails any part of the foregoing test will be given another opportunity. **EXHIBITORS WHO FAIL THE SECOND TIME WILL BE DECLARED DISQUALIFIED AND SHALL REMOVE THEIR ANIMAL(S) FROM THE FAIRGROUNDS BEFORE THE FAIR OPENS TO THE PUBLIC.**
- H. Grooming, feeding, handling and other care of the animal at the Fair is part of the livestock project and the responsibility of the exhibitor. Professional fitters are prohibited. Cooperation among and between exhibitors in the same event is permitted and encouraged.
- I. Each exhibitor must personally show his or her animal unless prior permission of the Livestock Committee Chairman is received to do otherwise. FFA chapter or 4-H club animals may be exhibited by any member of the organization who would otherwise qualify as an eligible exhibitor. A person exhibiting for an organization may not also exhibit personally in the same show.
- J. Each exhibitor assumes all liability in case of the death or injury to the animal until sold. The purchaser assumes liability at the time of sale. The Lake County Fair at no time assumes responsibility for the health or injury of any livestock exhibited at the Fair.
- K. All exhibits must stay until the removal date and time for that exhibit. If an animal is removed early all premiums will be forfeited and the exhibitor will not be allowed to show any animal the following year.
- L. Exhibitors will be issued tickets for their show and sale night. Tickets are not issued for parents and/or family. Tickets must be purchased for entry to the fair during fair hours. You may purchase a discounted ticket that the Fair Association will be offering for 4-H/FFA members and their families. 4-H/FFA members and family members can purchase a 10-day ticket for \$10.00 (\$50.00 value). Please fill out the order form and return it to the fair office prior to February 28, 2006.
- M. No alcoholic beverages will be permitted on the Fairgrounds. Lake County Fair Association has a Zero Tolerance Policy for alcohol and drugs on the fairgrounds. Any evidence of drug or alcohol use will result in elimination of participation in any fair functions.
- N. Soft drinks may be served in paper cups, approved cans or plastic bottles. No glass bottles please.
- O. Smoking will not be permitted in the show sheds, tents or barns at any time.

ADDITIONAL RESPONSIBILITIES FOR MARKET ANIMAL EXHIBITORS:

- P. The following number of days will be used when calculating weight gain:
Steer - 183 days
- Q. The Lake County Fair will not sponsor the sale of any animal that has been eliminated or disqualified for any reason.
- R. **Each exhibitor must prepare a letter of thanks to the buyer of his or her stock and present the letter with an addressed stamped envelope, ready for mailing but not sealed, to your FFA Advisor or 4-H Leader. Your advisor will approve and forward these letters to the Fair Manager / Office. NO CHECKS WILL BE MAILED TO THAT EXHIBITOR UNTIL THE LETTER IS RECEIVED IN THE FAIR OFFICE. Exhibitors are also encouraged to send thank you letters to the sponsors of all the trophies, plaques or awards they received.**
- S. All exhibitors who sell stock at the Fair Sale will pay 5% of the auction price plus 5% of all add-ons that are paid through the Fair Office. The fee is for promotion and production of the Lake County Fair Livestock Shows and Sales.
- T. It is the responsibility of the exhibitor to furnish the fair office with all buyers names and addresses. All buyers ribbons/tickets will be mailed to the prospective buyer through the fair office. No tickets will be handed out to exhibitors. You must have their name and address in the office by March 15, 2006 in order for us to mail tickets to them in time for your show and sale. Previous year's buyers will be sent tickets so please provide information only on those not listed.
- U. All steer and swine must be sold at auction to the highest bidder.
- V. No graffiti will be permitted on animals. Graffiti is any symbol, writing, etc. on the hide of market animal. Any animal with graffiti will not be allowed to sell.
- W. All market animals sold must go to slaughter.
- X. Pictures of the exhibitor with buyer will be presented to the buyer as soon as possible. It is the responsibility of the exhibitor to see that they are presented to the buyer (preferably framed).
- Y. Exhibitors are not allowed in the working areas of the livestock pens during weigh-ins. Exhibitors will not be able to handle their animal until the animal has been issued and secured in a pen.

III. LIVESTOCK PREMIUMS & AWARDS QUALIFICATIONS

- A. All judging (unless otherwise noted) will be done on the Danish system of blue, red and white ribbons as follows:

- B. Showmanship Awards will be awarded for Heifer, Steer, Bull, Swine, Dairy, Goat and Sheep show.
- C. Record Book Awards will be awarded for each Beef Breeding, Steer, Swine, Dairy, Goat, Sheep, Rabbit and Poultry.
- D. Herdsman awards are offered for Beef Breeding, Steer and Swine show exhibitors. Exhibitors will be judged daily on the following basis:
1. Orderliness and cleanliness of service area, stall, pens, animals, and public walkways.
 2. Personal appearance of exhibitors.
 3. Cooperation with show officials in presenting attractive exhibits.
 4. Availability of either exhibitor or information about their exhibits.
- E. The Lake County Fair may announce and offer additional awards. It shall be the responsibility of the Livestock Committee to select the recipients of all special awards. The Livestock Committee's decision is final.
- F. Beef Breeding awards will be given out Friday, April 7, 2006 at 7:00 PM. Steer awards will be given out at 6:00 P.M. on the night of the sale. Swine awards will be given out at 4:00 P.M. on the night of the sale.
- G. Premium money will be mailed along with sale money to the exhibitor as soon as the letter of thanks is received by the FAIR MANAGER/OFFICE and the buyer has paid for the animal.
- H. There is no money paid for the rosette ribbons. These winners are chosen from the blue ribbon winners and they are paid only for the blue ribbon.
- I. There will be an award given to the Best All Around Lake County FFA chapter or 4-H club for outstanding cleanliness, courtesy, personal appearance and attitude. This award of \$100.00 will be given for each show - Dairy, Steer, Beef Breeding, Swine and Sheep/Goat. This award is given in honor of Charles E. Norris and therefore will be called the "Charles E. Norris Sportsman Award".
- J. There will be an award given to an exhibitor of each show in honor of a long time supporter James Richardson. This award will be called the "James 'Big Jim' Richardson Award" and will be given to an exhibitor participating in the show for their first time.
- K. Trophy and plaque sponsorship is determined upon the approval of the Lake County Fair Board of Directors.
- L. Each show must have a minimum of 6 exhibitors. Entry deadline is February 15, 2006.

IV. SHOW RULES AND CLASS REQUIREMENTS

A. BEEF BREEDING SHOW

**Open eligibility is for Lake County FFA and 4-H members only.
Applications must be postmarked on or before February 15, 2006.**

1. The Beef Breeding Show is open to heifers from 6 to 28 months old and bulls must be 9 months or older as 4/1/2006.
2. All Heifers over 28 months must show evidence of reproduction or have a veterinarian's certificate of pregnancy. Calves at side, if any, must be on halter and be led in shows by another qualified and eligible exhibitor not entered in this class. Failure to meet these requirements will mean disqualification of cow and calf. The manageability test (Section II. F.) applies to cow and calf and will be enforced.
3. Bull age: Calf must be 9 months old by 4/1/2006.
4. Bulls must be registered by a Breed Association.
5. Entries will be divided into workable classes by age. All classes will be determined as of 4/1/2006.
6. Ownership of the animals must be vested by January 31, 2006. (Bill of Sale, etc.)
7. An exhibitor may enter up to two (2) heifers, two (2) bulls and one (1) aged cow, but only one (1) per class with a maximum of five (5) animals.
8. The requirements of showing a bull are that the exhibitor be a senior exhibitor and has shown a previous year in a livestock show (steer, heifer, dairy or open breed show).
9. All animals will be permanently and legibly identified by tattoo and/or brand. These identifying numbers must appear on the official application. Vaccination tattoos are not to be considered a form of identification.
10. All animals will be naturally polled or properly dehorned with no more than 1/2 inch showing.
9. EXHIBITORS ARE REQUIRED TO DEMONSTRATE THEIR ABILITY TO SAFELY CONTROL THEIR ANIMALS. After all animals are checked in, a manageability test will be held from the assigned area. Each exhibitor shall untie, parade demonstrate their ability to show their animal and resecure their animal. Exhibitor responsibility for demonstrating their animal will include setting up their animal while having control of their animal. Each exhibitor will be required to do all steps without assistance regardless of age and size of exhibitor. Any exhibitor who fails any part of the foregoing test will be given another opportunity. EXHIBITORS WHO FAIL THE SECOND TIME WILL BE DECLARED DISQUALIFIED AND SHALL REMOVE THEIR ANIMAL(S) FROM THE FAIRGROUNDS BEFORE THE FAIR OPENS TO THE PUBLIC.
11. Unruly animals judged to be safety hazards to their exhibitor or others will be excused from the ring.
12. All 4-H and FFA members must wear appropriate 4-H or FFA colors.
13. All exhibits must stay until the removal date and time for that exhibit. If an animal is removed early all premiums will be forfeited and the exhibitor will not be allowed to show any animal the following year.
14. It will be the responsibility of the Show Judge to select Outstanding Lake County Beef Breeding.

B. STEER SHOW AND SALE

1. The initial weigh-in for Steer will be held October 7, 2005, from 1:00 P.M. to 5:00 P.M. at the Fairgrounds.
2. All Steer exhibitors must be 10 years old by September 1, 2005.
3. The Livestock Committee will apply numbered ear tags and freeze brands. All identifying brands and ear tag numbers must be entered on the official application. Should an ear tag be lost, exhibitor MUST notify the Livestock Committee Chairman immediately.
4. There will be no minimum weight for Steer at initial weigh-in. The Livestock Committee recommends that a Steer weigh at least 550 pounds at initial weigh-in to be able to make the mandatory 1,000 pounds at the final weigh-in. The weight must be entered on the official application. Accepting the application of an exhibitor in no way implies that the animal will qualify for the show and sale.
5. All Steer must be naturally polled or properly dehorned with no more than 1/2 inch showing at the time of final weigh-in. There will be no animal dehorned at the initial weigh-in by the Livestock Committee.
6. An exhibitor may enter two animals at the initial weigh-in and make the final selection of the animal to be shown at the time of check-in. Separate official applications and proofs of ownership (if applicable) must be submitted on all potential entries at the initial weigh-in.
7. If a Steer has lost it's center teeth at the time of the initial weigh-in, the exhibitor must submit a breeder's affidavit stating the Steer's actual age. The Steer must not be over 27 months old at the time of show.
8. Steer must weigh at least 1,000 pounds on a zero tolerance scale at the final weigh-in at Fair time and must conform to accepted show standards. Allowance will be given for scale tolerance, if any. Bulls, extremes in poor conformation, staginess, crippled Steer, lightly muscled or thinly fleshed Steer with obviously unsatisfactory weight for their age will be eliminated from the show and sale. Steer weighing over 1350 pounds will sell at a maximum selling weight of 1,350 pounds. ♦ STEER MUST HAVE GAINED IN 183 days, 1.5 POUNDS PER DAY OR MORE.
10. All animals will be graded by ultrasound. This will aid in your analysis of your steer to help produce better animals each year. Ultrasound will be used as a qualification to show and sell. All steers must have a minimum of one-fourth (0.25) of an inch of back fat cover at the final weigh-in. The amount of back fat decision of the designee or designees shall be conclusive.
11. There will be only one final weigh-in at the Fair. If the animal does not meet the weight and ultrasound requirements, then you will be asked to remove your animal at the end of weigh-in. If your animal meets the weight requirements, the manageability, other requirements stated in these rules and all exhibitor responsibilities and qualifications have been met, then you may show and sell.
12. EXHIBITORS ARE REQUIRED TO DEMONSTRATE THEIR ABILITY TO SAFELY CONTROL THEIR ANIMALS. After all animals are checked in, a manageability test will be held from the assigned area. Each exhibitor shall untie, parade demonstrate their ability to show their animal and resecure their animal. Exhibitor responsibilities for demonstrating their animal will include setting up their animal, walking their animal while having control of their animal. Each exhibitor will be required to do all steps without assistance regardless of age and size of exhibitor. Any exhibitor who fails any part of the foregoing test will be given another opportunity. EXHIBITORS WHO FAIL THE SECOND TIME WILL BE DECLARED DISQUALIFIED AND SHALL REMOVE THEIR ANIMAL(S) FROM THE FAIRGROUNDS BEFORE THE FAIR OPENS TO THE PUBLIC.
13. Unruly animals judged to be safety hazards to their exhibitors or others will be excused from the ring.
14. Steer will be divided by weight into workable classes in FFA and 4-H divisions.
15. All 4-H and FFA members must wear appropriate 4-H or FFA colors.
16. It will be the responsibility of the Show Judge to select Outstanding Lake County Steer.

C. SWINE SHOW AND SALE

1. The initial check-in for swine will be held January 6, 2006, from 2:00 P.M. to 5:00 P.M. at the Fairgrounds.
2. An exhibitor may enter two animals at the initial check-in and make the final selection of the animal to be shown at the time of arrival at the show.
3. The Livestock Committee will apply numbered ear tags in each ear at the initial weigh-in. All identifying ear tag numbers must be entered on the official applications. Should an ear tag be lost, the exhibitor MUST notify the Livestock Committee Chairman immediately.
4. Swine will be tagged but not weighed. The Livestock committee recommends that the animal weigh no less than 50 pounds and no more than 90 pounds at the initial check-in to be able to make the mandatory 220 pounds at the final weigh-in. The ear tag must be entered on the official application and turned into the FAIR MANAGER / OFFICE at the time of the initial check-in. Ownership of the animal must be vested with the exhibitor at this time.
5. Barrows and open gilts may be entered. At the time of check-in, any gilt showing signs of having been bred will be disqualified from the show and sale unless a veterinarian's statement is obtained stating that the gilt is unbred. Should a contested animal be found to be unbred, the Fair will assume the cost of the pregnancy test.
6. All animals must weigh 220 pounds or more at Fair time check-in. Animals weighing more than 300 pounds will sell at a maximum weight of 300 pounds.
7. All animals will be graded by ultrasound and only USDA No. 1 animals will be eligible to show and sell.
8. All 4-H and FFA members must wear appropriate 4-H or FFA colors.
9. Entries will be divided by weight into workable classes.

D. YOUTH DAIRY SHOW

ENTRIES:

1. All entries shall be on the official entry form. Entries must be clearly printed or typed and all information complete.
2. Official entry forms for Dairy must be postmarked and mailed to the Fair Office, P.O. Box 221, Eustis, FL 32727-0221, on or before February 15, 2006.
3. Dairy exhibitors may enter up to four animals. No more than one animal may be shown per class.
4. Each show must have a minimum of 6 exhibitors. Entry deadline is February 15, 2006.

ELIGIBILITY:

1. As set forth in the General Rules & Regulations, Youth Livestock Shows, Section I, Exhibitor Eligibility.
2. The Dairy Show is invitational with limited entries. Entries shall be accepted on a first come basis with priority given to Lake County exhibitors.
3. Ownership of dairy animals must be vested in the exhibitor no later than January 31, 2006.

HEALTH REGULATIONS:

1. As set forth in the Health Regulations and Requirements.

EXHIBITOR RESPONSIBILITIES:

1. As set forth in the General Rules & Regulations, Youth Livestock Shows, Section II, Exhibitor Responsibilities.
2. In order to reduce the chances of bodily injury, all dairy animals must be de-horned.
3. All dairy animals showing as two-year olds and older must show evidence of reproduction. Cows 3 years old and older must have freshened at least one time. Two-year olds must have freshened or have been diagnosed pregnant prior to the show. Any animals not meeting these requirements as determined by the Superintendent, will be disqualified.

GENERAL:

1. No exhibitors will be allowed to have any bedding (straw or hay). Failure to comply with the rule would cause forfeiture of all premiums.
2. The Dairy Cattle Show is open to Ayshire, Brown Swiss, Guernsey, Holstein and Jersey Females.
3. All animals must have an identification certificate issued by the respective breed association.
4. All exhibits must stay until the removal date and time for that exhibit and stall must be clean. If an animal is removed early all premiums will be forfeited and the exhibitor will not be allowed to show any animal the following year.
5. Thank you letters must be sent to award sponsors.

National Sheep and Goat SCRAPIE ERADICATION PROGRAM EFFECTIVE JULY 1, 2005

	Requirements for Identification of Sheep and Goats in Shows, Exhibitions, and Fairs	
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This information is presented to clarify the mandatory identification requirements for sheep and goats under the National Scrapie Eradication Program. There are two components of the identification requirements that must be met before sheep and goats are allowed to move into the state or within Florida (intrastate) for shows, exhibitions, and fairs.

1. Premises Identification – Before official individual animal identification tags can be issued, the owner/agent must register the premises on which the animal is located and obtain a premises identification number from USDA.
2. Individual Animal Identification – Once the premises is registered, the owner/agent will receive official individual animal identification tags for identifying each sheep and goat. Applicator pliers will be provided to FFA, 4-H leaders and/or fair/livestock/show committee for assisting exhibitors in application of the official ear tags.

Note: Sheep and goats must be officially identified before commingling with other groups of animals. For registered purebred sheep and goats identified with a permanent official breed registration number, official ear tags are not required. However, upon presentation of such animals for exhibition, a copy of the breed registration certificate must accompany each animal. Regardless of the method of official identification, each animal must be associated with a premises identification number.

The premises must be registered before the exhibitor can receive the official individual ear tag for each animal. The official tags must be applied to the exhibitor's animals prior to presenting them for exhibition. Official ear tags must be affixed by FFA, 4-H leaders or by a representative of the Livestock Show Committee or veterinarian.

3. Official Entry Forms for Lake County Dairy Goats must be postmarked and mailed to the Lake County Fair Office, P.O. Box 221, Eustis, FL 32727-0221, on or before February 15, 2006.
4. All entrants must be bona fide 4-H or FFA members in good standing of the current academic year.
5. Ownership of dairy goats must be vested in the exhibitor no later than December 15, 2005.
6. Goat exhibitors may enter up to 8 animals with no more than 2 animals per class.
7. All contestants must fill out a project record book. Awards will be presented for junior and senior "Best Record Book".
8. All who begin the project are expected to complete the project.
9. Members should make advance arrangements for the care and housing of the goats. Especially in respect to family dogs or wild animals.
10. A junior and senior Showmanship Contest will be held as part of the Dairy Goat Show. Junior Showmanship is open to exhibitors who are under 13 years of age on September 1, 2005.
11. Each exhibitor must assume liability in case of death or injury to his or her goat(s) until the conclusion of the show.
12. Exhibitors are expected to keep neat and clean quarters while their goat(s) is/are on the show grounds.
13. No exhibitors will be allowed to have any bedding (straw or hay). Failure to comply with this rule would cause forfeiture of all premiums.
14. The Dairy Goat Show will begin at 5:30 P.M., on Saturday, April 8, 2006.
15. Dairy Goats will show in age divisions, as shown below.
16. Any Does 2 years old or older, not having kidded, are ineligible to show.
17. Goats shall be tied-out. Exhibitors are required to furnish their own tie-outs.
18. Goats will be shown with collars.
19. Goats must be shown by the exhibitor, unless there are 2 entries being shown in the same class.
20. All goats must be registered with the American Dairy Goat Association.
21. All goats must be dehorned.
22. Goats must have a health certificate stating that they are free of disease.
23. White shirt and dark pants and shoes are required show attire.
24. Animal(s) should be properly clipped and groomed.
25. No substitutions will be allowed.
26. Thank you letters must be sent to award sponsors.
27. All exhibits must stay until the removal date and time for that exhibit. If an animal is removed early all premiums will be forfeited and the exhibitor will not be allowed to show any animal the following year.
28. Record Books are to be turned in one hour after check-in.
29. If you compete for Showmanship you must use an animal that is registered to show! (NO exceptions)

G. YOUTH POULTRY SHOW

It is the responsibility of each exhibitor to familiarize himself or herself with the following rules and regulations.

ENTRIES:

1. All entries shall be on the Official Entry Form. Entries must be clearly printed with all details given to avoid errors. Be sure ALL information is complete.
2. Official Entry Forms must be postmarked and mailed to the Lake County Fair Office, P.O. Box 221, Eustis, FL. 32727-0221, on or before February 15, 2006.
3. The following birds may be entered: Cock, Hen, Cockerel, Pullet.
4. Water Fowl, Turkeys and Fighting Birds are NOT allowed.
5. Substitutions, if necessary, must have the approval of the Superintendent.
6. The Superintendent reserves the right to reject any entry.
7. Layer Pens - shall consist of three pullets of the same age, breed and variety. There will be ten pens allotted. Only birds provided by Poultry Superintendent will be eligible for show and must be raised by exhibitor. Call Poultry Superintendent by October 10, 2005, to place your order. Superintendent will notify exhibitors of time and place to pick up chicks.
8. Junior and Senior Exhibitors may have up to three entries. Cloverbuds can have one entry. There is no guarantee that all will be able to be shown. The Superintendent will have the authority to cut back on the number of birds shown according to the availability of pens.

ELIGIBILITY:

1. All entries must be bonafided property of the Exhibitor.
2. Exhibitor must be either a 4-H or FFA member in good standing and enrolled in a poultry project.
3. Cloverbuds (Ages 5 – 7 as of September 1, 2005) cannot compete for awards. For Cloverbuds there will be an educational exhibit with a judge in attendance. All other rules of the Poultry Show (including delivery and pick-up times) apply.
4. Record Books will be mandatory with the exception of Cloverbuds. Unacceptable or incomplete Record Books as determined by screening committee or signee may be cause for exhibitor disqualification from showing their animal.

HEALTH:

1. All birds will be given pullorum-typhoid blood test on entry. Reactors will be taken by the Department of Agriculture and not returned to the Exhibitor.

ARRIVAL:

1. Poultry will be received between 3:00 P.M. and 6:00 P.M. on Wednesday, April 5, 2006.
2. Pens will be assigned by the Superintendent upon arrival.

RELEASE:

1. All exhibits must stay until the removal date and time for that exhibit. If an animal is removed early all premiums will be forfeited and the exhibitor will not be allowed to show any animal the following year.
2. Poultry must be removed from the Showroom between 10:00 PM and 11:00 PM on Saturday, April 15, 2006, closing night of the Fair.

JUDGING:

1. Judging will begin at 2:30 P.M. on Saturday, April 8, 2006.
2. The decision of the Judge will be final.
3. The Modified Danish System of judging will be used in making awards.
4. Paper stickers, showing the bird's placing, will be placed on front of the cage cards and ribbons awarded to exhibitors at the time of judging.

GENERAL:

1. The Lake County Fair Association will not assume any responsibility whatsoever for loss of poultry in any manner.
2. Poultry will be fed and watered daily by Association.
3. Poultry pens cannot be opened except by Superintendent.

Sale proceeds will not be disbursed until letters are submitted and payment is received from Buyer(s).

H. YOUTH RABBIT SHOW

It is the responsibility of each exhibitor to familiarize himself or herself with the following rules and regulations.

ENTRIES:

1. All entries shall be on the Official Entry Form. Entries must be clearly printed or typed with all details given to avoid errors. Be sure ALL information is complete.
2. Official Entry Forms must be postmarked and mailed to the Lake County Fair Office, P.O. Box 221 Eustis, FL 32727-0221, on or before February 15, 2006.
3. The following rabbits may be entered: Buck, Doe and Meat Pen. **No neutered rabbits will be shown.**
4. Substitutions, if necessary, must have the approval of the Superintendent.
5. Junior & Senior Exhibitors may enter up to three rabbits. Cloverbuds may have one entry. There is no guarantee that all will be able to be shown. The Superintendent will have the authority to cut back on the number of rabbits shown according to the availability of pens.
6. All rabbits will have a number imprinted in their ears upon entry (ink used will wear off and will not harm the animal). This number will be their cage number and will serve as their identification during the Fair.
7. Ownership of rabbits must be vested in the exhibitor no later than December 15, 2005.
8. **Only purebred rabbits can be shown.** No rabbits under 12 weeks will be eligible to show.

ELIGIBILITY:

1. All entries must be bonafided property of the Exhibitor.
2. Exhibitor must be either a 4-H or FFA member in good standing and enrolled in a rabbit project.
3. Cloverbuds (Ages 5 – 7 as of September 1, 2005) cannot compete for awards. For Cloverbuds there will be an educational exhibit with a judge in attendance. All other rules of the Rabbit Show (including delivery and pick-up times) apply.

HEALTH:

1. No sick or diseased rabbit will be allowed in the Showroom. It is suggested that each exhibitor check his or her rabbit's ears for canker (a few drops of baby oil in the ears a few weeks prior to the show will help to prevent disqualification of your animal). Any entry rejected on entry day for sickness or disease will not be allowed to return to the Showroom.
2. Any rabbit showing signs of pregnancy will be palpated. If pregnant, entry will be disqualified.

ARRIVAL:

1. Rabbits will be received between 3:00 P.M. and 6:00 P.M. on Wednesday, April 5, 2006.
2. Pens will be assigned by the Superintendent upon arrival.

RELEASE:

1. All exhibits must stay until the removal date and time for that exhibit. If an animal is removed early all premiums will be forfeited and the exhibitor will not be allowed to show any animal the following year.
2. Rabbits must be removed from the Showroom between 10:00 P.M. and 11:00 P.M. on Saturday, April 15, 2006 closing night of the Fair.

JUDGING:

1. Judging will begin at 5:00 P.M. on Saturday, April 8, 2006.
2. The decision of the Judge will be final.
3. The Modified Danish System for judging will be used in making awards.
4. Judge's remarks will be recorded by the Show Secretary.
5. Paper stickers, showing the rabbit's placing, will be placed on front of the cage cards and ribbons awarded to Exhibitors at the time of judging.

GENERAL:

1. The Lake County Fair Association will not assume any responsibility whatsoever for loss of rabbits in any manner.
2. Rabbits may not be bred in the Showroom.
3. No toys or blankets are allowed in cages.
4. Rabbit pens cannot be opened except by Superintendent.
5. Rabbits will be fed and watered daily by the Fair Association. Exhibitors showing Meat Pens are asked to please bring LARGE feed and water bowls. If a special diet is required for your rabbits, it is the responsibility of the exhibitor to feed rabbits at least 1 hour prior to opening of the fair each day. Exhibitor must have a ticket to enter each day of the fair.
6. Live Meat Pen -- shall consist of three rabbits, all of the same breed and variety, not over 70 days of age, and a minimum weight of three (3) pounds each and a maximum weight of five (5) pounds each. Meat Pen must be bred and raised by the exhibitor.
7. Exhibitors may enter more than one Meat Pen, but will be allowed to sell only one. If an Exhibitor wishes not to sell a Live Meat Pen, he or she must notify the Superintendent at the time of entry.
8. Exhibitor may place For Sale sign on pen with their phone number. NO sales transactions may take place until after exhibitor has checked out at release time. Poultry or Barn Superintendent will not be responsible for transaction.
